Every time I wake up in the morning I ask myself what is the Lord saying to me, and many at times this verses comes into my mind. When I meet people on my way, I find them with different needs and ask God how He would want me to help them **Matthew 25:35-40** comes

in to mind ³⁵ *For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, ³⁶ I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'*

I began with clarifying why God was calling me to start a street ministry. I identified the specific spiritual and practical needs I wanted to address, and one was evangelism, discipleship, social outreach, or healing and deliverance. I discovered a well-defined purpose that helps me stay focused, and communicate my vision to others, and attract like-minded support.

What do you think are the main causes of homelessness / street connected children that drives hundreds of children to the streets? The growing population of street-connected families and children in Nakuru County is primarily driven by **socio-economic hardships, domestic instability, and rapid urbanization**. Despite a nationwide drop in street-family numbers, urban centres like Nakuru City, Molo and Naivasha remain focal points for children connected to the streets / homelessness.

My focus was on the boy child who God called me to serve, the homeless individuals, youth and families. I understand their struggles, spiritual questions, and preferred ways of communication which will shape our ministry's approach. We had to tailor programs that meets their needs, whether through Bible studies, music, street performances / sports, or practical assistance.

Children connected to the streets face a complex web of challenges including poverty, abuse, neglect, lack of education, health risks, and social marginalization.

Poverty and Basic Needs

Poverty is a primary driver that forces children onto the streets and continues to affect them while living there. Many children connected to the streets lack access to **food, shelter, clothing, and healthcare**, leading to malnutrition, illness, and injury. Economic deprivation at home often results in neglect and abuse, leaving children to fend for themselves and sometimes resort to **child labor, begging, or petty crime** to survive. The denial of basic needs also hinders their psychological and emotional development, preventing them from achieving self-actualization

For the last seven years the Bridge Ministry has been able to reach out 3,700 children and reintegrate 65 back to their community.

The biggest challenge that we face is medical issues, insecurity for our children, rejection from the society and lack of structures from the authority.
